RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF REPEAL OF THE JONES ACT

Whereas, the Hawai'i Republican Party supports *Liberty* and *Limited Government* wherein government enforces laws that allow for a prosperous free market and does not compete with nor over-regulate the free market,

Whereas, the Jones Act is a current Federal law that regulates interstate maritime transportation between U.S. ports;

Whereas, studies show the Jones Act restricts competition in the shipping industry and causes higher consumer prices;

Whereas, studies further show the Jones Act has caused near-monopoly shipping conditions for maritime commerce to and from the State of Hawai'i;

Whereas, studies also show that the Jones Act's increase in consumer prices are particularly pronounced in Hawai'i, which lacks access to international or interstate commercial rail or highway transportation;

Whereas, the Jones Act was passed by Congress in 1920, nearly 40 years before Hawaii became a state, and never contemplated implementation in a non-contiguous state;

Whereas, the Jones Act may have caused a delay in use of foreign vessels in the effort to clean up the 2010 British Petroleum oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico;

Whereas, several members of Congress have called for the repeal or reform of the Jones Act:

Therefore, be it resolved, that the Hawai'i Republican Party in convention at Lihue, Hawai'i, May 14, 2011, in advocacy of *Liberty* and *Limited Government*, supports the repeal of the Jones Act;

Be it further resolved, in the alternative, that the Hawai'i Republican Party supports an amendment to the Jones Act to exempt Hawai'i from the Jones Act;

Be it further resolved that the Hawai'i Republican Party urges Hawai'i's Congressional delegation to act in the best interest of Hawai'i residents, families, and small businesses by supporting repeal of the Jones Act or exempting Hawai'i from the Jones Act.;

And be it further resolved that copies of this resolution shall be posted on the Hawai`i Republican party website and distributed to all members of Congress, Hawai`i elected officials, media, and the general public.
